Nine candidates seek the episcopacy office

Nine candidates have been endorsed by various annual conferences and caucus groups to fill two new bishop positions in the Northeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church. During a special session held virtually on October 15, delegates to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference voted to elect two bishops at this conference.

The endorsed candidates are a diverse group. Three women. Six men. Three Hispanics. One African-American. One Asian-American. Four White Americans. One general secretary. One pastor. Four district superintendents. Two educators. One director of connectional ministries.

The nine official candidates are (in alphabetical order): Giovanni Arroyo, endorsed by MARCHA; Thomas L. Blackstone, endorsed by New England Conference; Hector Burgos Nunez, endorsed by MARCHA; Christian De La Rosa, endorsed by MARCHA; Wendy Deichmann, endorsed Upper New York Conference; Sang Won Doh, endorsed by Greater New Jersey Conference; Alyce Weaver Dunn, endorsed by Western Pennsylvania Conference; Andrew L. Foster III, endorsed by BMCR; and Robert F. Zilhaver, endorsed by Western Pennsylvania Conference.

Arroyo currently serves as general secretary for the Commission on Religions and Race; Blackstone is the pastor at The UMC in East Greenwich, Rhode Island; Burgos is a district superintendent in Greater New Jersey Conference; De La Rosa is the associate dean for Students and Community Life at Boston University School of Theology; Deichmann is a faculty member at United Theological

Electronic Voting Instructions for 2022 NEJ Conference

On the first ballot (and subsequent ballots until there is an election) you will vote for 2 candidates. Using your keypad you will be instructed to enter the 3 digit number for each candidate. *Nominee numbers will be entered one at a time. You will have a total of 60 seconds to vote for 2 candidates.* When the voting is complete, the Presiding Officer will close the ballot.

Delegates will receive a list of ballot numbers to use throughout the election process. You will also receive a ballot summary sheet to keep track of the voting.

The 9 persons that have been nominated by an Annual Conference or an approved caucus will be assigned the lowest numbers on the ballot. Additionally, all Elders who are elected Delegates or elected Reserve Delegates to this conference will be assigned a number as well.

CASTING YOUR VOTE USING THE VOTING DEVICE

- > Select the ballot number for the desired candidate. You will find her/his number on the ballot sheet.
- ➤ When prompted by the Presiding Officer to begin the balloting, you will see the words, "Please vote" on your keypad. At that point, enter the number for the desired candidate. Once you enter the 3 digit number, that number will be displayed on the keypad.
- ➤ When you see the desired number on the device screen, press the "send" button. The keypad will then display the word sending...followed by the number of choices that remain. You will then vote for the 2nd candidate. Your election will be transmitted to the computer and votes will be tabulated.
- ➤ The keypad will not allow you to vote for: the same person twice on any given ballot; vote for someone already elected; someone who has withdrawn; or if you enter a number that has not been assigned. If you enter a 3 digit number that is invalid, you will notice the number of choices that remain does not decrease—thereby telling you the number you entered was not a valid number.
- ➤ Padgett Communications will tabulate the results. The Tellers under the supervision of the Head Teller will tally any write-in votes (see below) and will add those results to the results from the electronic devices.
- ➤ All votes cast will remain secret.
- ➤ The Presiding Officer will announce results as soon as possible—and we will continue the process until 2 persons are elected.

CASTING VOTES FOR WRITE-IN VOTES

➤ If you wish to vote for someone for whom no ballot number is assigned, you will vote by using a PAPER BALLOT. You will use the paper ballot for that entire ballot.

- ➤ If you wish to have a write-in ballot, when instructed by the Presiding Officer, please raise your hand and the Teller will give you a paper ballot.
- ➤ On the paper ballot you must write the ballot number and the electronic voting handset number for the ballot to be valid.
- ➤ You may vote for one Candidate who already has a number and 1 write-in Candidate or you may vote for 2 write-in candidates. The total number of candidates on the write-in ballot must be 2 (if we are electing 2). If we are only electing 1, then you may only vote for 1.
- ➤ When you have finished, raise your hand and a Teller will pick up your ballot.
- ➤ On the next ballot you may choose to vote for another write-in candidate that does not have a voting number assigned by requesting another write in ballot or you may use your keypad to vote for persons already assigned a number.

VOTING DEVICE DIFFICULTY

➤ IF YOUR VOTING DEVICE IS INOPERABLE, raise your hand and a Teller will take your device and give you a paper ballot upon which you will vote for your desired candidates using the ballot numbers. If your device fails in the middle of voting, raise your hand and you will vote entirely using the write-in ballot. A new device will be delivered to you for the next ballot.

RESERVE DELEGATE KEYPADS

- ➤ The Chair of the Delegation is responsible for the distribution of the voting devices for each session and the collection of the devices at the conclusion of each session.
- ➤ All delegates are in covenant to vote using only the device given to them. Any delegate observing an unauthorized person voting on a device or who is voting using more than one device should immediately stand and notify the Presiding Officer of an irregularity.
- ➤ If the Chair of the delegation is a nominee or becomes a write-in nominee, she/he will have the first elected Lay Person be in charge of the voting devices and all matters pertaining to the election.

INVALID BALLOTS

- ➤ The following actions will invalidate a ballot
 - Voting for fewer than the number to be elected on that ballot.
 - Voting for someone who has already been elected.
 - Voting for the same nominee more than once per ballot.
 - Voting for someone who has withdrawn.

REMINDERS

- You must be in the bar of the conference to vote.
- ➤ You will have 60 seconds to cast your vote for 2 Episcopal Candidates.
- ➤ If you choose not to participate in a particular ballot, do not use your keypad for any selection.
- ➤ If you make a mistake in voting, press 3 zeros (000) followed by the send button—before the ballot is closed. This will clear ALL of your choices for that ballot and you will need to enter the 3 digit numbers again.
- ➤ If you input the incorrect number during the voting and you see it BEFORE you press "send", press the "DEL" button on the UPPER-LEFT corner to remove one number at a time. Re-enter the correct number and press send.
- Every handset will be tested before the conference, so the probability of failure is very low. If your handset does not work, raise your hand quickly and you will receive a paper ballot and you will be issued a new handset before the next ballot.
- ➤ If a reserve is seated for a delegate, she/he will use that delegate's handset.

DO NOT TAKE THE DEVICE FROM THE CALVERT BALLROOM.

CHAIRS OF DELEGATIONS MUST TURN IN ALL VOTING DEVICES AT THE END OF EACH SESSION.

IF THERE IS A FAILURE TO TURN IN A MACHINE, THE DELEGATE THAT WAS ASSIGNED THE MACHINE WILL BE ASSESSED THE COST OF THE MACHINE.

- 34 WHEREAS, A lack of safe and affordable onsite child care during Jurisdictional Conference
- 35 sessions
- presents a barrier to full participation of lay and clergy members with young children.

- 38 WHEREAS, the lack of childcare access at Jurisdictional Conference adversely impacts delegates
- 39 with young children from full participation in all sessions. This lack of basic access to childcare
- 40 disproportionately impacts women particularly breastfeeding parents thereby creating a
- 41 preventable barrier to participation. Furthermore, this preventable barrier discourages parents
- of young children from seeking election as general and jurisdictional conference delegates.

- 2 WHEREAS, The Social Principles of The United Methodist Church in paragraph 162.C states:
- 3 "Once
- 4 considered the property of their parents, children are now acknowledged to be full human
- 5 beings in
- 6 their own right, but beings to whom adults and society in general have special obligations.

- 8 support the development of school systems and innovative methods of education designed to
- 9 assist
- 10 every child toward complete fulfillment as an individual person of worth."

- 12 WHEREAS, bodies throughout the United Methodist Connection offer child care options

- but not limited to safe sanctuary cleared volunteer childcare, paid childcare, and Vacation Bible
- 15 School which provide children of lay and clergy members the opportunity to build community

- 19 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, childcare, which meets the standards of the state in which the
- 20 sessions are held, shall be offered as an option for all sessions of the Northeast Jurisdictional

- 15 WHEREAS the seven Central Conferences and five U.S. Jurisdictions of The United
- 16 Methodist Church engage in mission together in 136 countries; and
- 17 WHEREAS the connectional ties between the church in the United States and the Central
- 18 Conferences are of sacred worth and vital to the ministry of the global United Methodist
- 19 Church; however,
- 20 WHEREAS the existing global structure of The United Methodist Church has historically
- 21 prohibited each region from effectively tailoring its ministry to its specific local context;
- 22 and
- 23 WHEREAS because the existing structure of the United Methodist Church diminishes our
- 24 ability to be a vital and effective church, that structure should be re-envisioned; and
- 25 WHEREAS the creation of a U.S. Regional Conference and the conversion of the Central
- 26 Conferences to Regional Conferences, as outlined in the Christmas Covenant, would
- establish structural equity throughout the global church; and
- 28 WHEREAS the creation of a U.S. Regional Conference, as outlined in the Christmas
- 29 Covenant from the Philippines, will establish the governance necessary to allow the
- 30 Northeastern Jurisdiction to design ministry for its particular context, and thus more

- 14 WHEREAS the purpose of this Protocol¹ was to provide a time-limited and graceful way for the
- 15 United Methodist Church to amicably separate into new denominational expressions with a
- 16 minimum of rancor, controversy, and harm; and
- 17 WHEREAS the COVID-19 pandemic has caused the delay of a decision on this Protocol by the
- 18 General Conference until 2024, well past the original five-month delay contemplated by the
- 19 agreement; and
- 20 WHEREAS the 2019 General Conference provided a way with Par. 2553 of the Book of
- 21 Discipline for congregations to disaffiliate without waiting for the Protocol;
- 22 WHEREAS the Global Methodist Church (GMC) was launched on May 1, 2022, without the
- 23 benefit of the Protocol, and in some conferences outside of the West, there has been recruiting of
- 24 some United Methodist Churches and pastors to disaffiliate from the UMC to join the GMC;
- 25 and
- 26 WHEREAS six of the original 15 organizations and caucuses which were involved in the
- 27 negotiation of the Protocol have withdrawn their support of the agreement², saying that its time
- 28 has passed; and
- 29 WHEREAS there has been an escalation of confusion, misunderstanding, misinformation, and
- 30 disinformation in this context, such that the connectional relationships with the global United
- 31 Methodist community are being harmed, with bishops calling for greater clarity and honesty in
- 32 the information being advanced about the process of remaining United Methodist or
- 33 disaffiliating; and
- 34 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Northeastern Jurisdiction Conference recommends
- rejecting the Protocol, and urges delegates to General Conference to reject the Protocol.

QUEER DELEGATES' CALL TO CENTER JUSTICE AND EMPOWERMENT FOR LGBTQIA+1 PEOPLE IN THE UMC RESOLUTION TO THE 2022 NORTHEASTERN JURISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE

 Whereas, in a groundswell response to the passage of harmful legislation at the 2019 Special Session of General Conference, Annual Conferences elected queer clergy and lay persons to be General and Jurisdictional Delegates in record numbers, for the first time empowering queer delegates to speak and act from our diverse experiences, and

- 15 Whereas, the 2019 Special Session of the United Methodist General Conference passed the
- 16 Traditional Plan, which increased penalties for United Methodists clergy who are LGBTQIA+

17 and

- 18 for clergy who support the LGBTQIA+ community through officiating their weddings, and
- 19 Whereas, in an attempt to address the divide within The United Methodist Church, an abeyance
- or moratorium was proposed to the General Conference, referenced below,² by the authors of
- 21 the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation, and

Whereas, we understand our call and responsibility as United Methodists to do good, do no harm, and stay in love with God, and Whereas, we call straight and cisgender allies to do good by using their voice and vote to support, empower, and amplify the voices of the LGBTQIA+ community in The United Methodist Church,

Therefore be it resolved that the 2022 Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference of The United Methodist Church:

1. Supports and amplifies the queer delegates' call to justice and empowerment for the LGBTQIA+ community in our Jurisdiction, within and beyond our churches and agencies;

2. Affirms the spirit of the abeyance or moratorium as proposed to the General Conference, as referenced above, until changes can be made in The United Methodist Book of Discipline.

 3. Implores our member Annual Conferences to either not pursue or resolve in an appropriately timely fashion through a non-punitive, just resolution process any complaints against clergy regarding their sexual orientation or clergy who officiate weddings of LGBTQIA+ persons;

4. Urges that as a Jurisdiction we either not pursue or resolve in an appropriately timely fashion through a non-punitive, just resolution process any complaints against Bishops regarding their sexual orientation or those who officiate weddings of LGBTQIA+ persons;

proceedings (including, without limitation, a bishop's supervisory response, suspension proceedings, attempts to achieve a just resolution, or referral of a complaint) shall be initiated,

and all current or pending complaint proceedings shall be suspended, insofar as the alleged 26

27 Book of Discipline violation asserted in the complaint is that the respondent is a 'self-avowed

28 practicing homosexual' (however that term may be defined, including, without limitation,

29 living in a same-gender marriage, domestic partnership or civil union); that the respondent has 30


conducted, officiated, performed, celebrated, or blessed a same-gender wedding or other same-

gender union; that the respondent has certified, licensed, commissioned, ordained, consecrated, 31

32 or appointed a 'self-avowed practicing homosexual'; that the respondent has

- 33 provided 'funds to any gay caucus or group' or used funds 'to promote the acceptance of
- 34 homosexuality'; or that the respondent has otherwise engaged in conduct that The Book of
- 35 Discipline of The United Methodist Church currently states is 'incompatible with Christian
- 36 teaching' as it pertains to LGBTQ relationships. This moratorium on all new and pending
- 37 complaint proceedings concerning human sexuality provisions applies not only to charges that
- 38 are explicitly based on ¶ 2702.1b, but also to any charge that the same alleged underlying
- 39 conduct constitutes a chargeable offense under any other provision of the Discipline, including
- 40 (without limitation) 'immorality' under ¶ 2702.1a; 'disobedience to the order and discipline of
- 41 The United Methodist Church' under ¶ 2702.1d; and 'dissemination of
- doctrines contrary to the established standards of doctrine of The United Methodist Church' 42
- 43 under ¶ 2702.1e. This moratorium is inclusive of charges related to the following paragraphs: ¶

- 1 161, ¶ 304.3, ¶ 310.2, ¶ 341.6, ¶ 613.19, ¶ 806.9, and ¶ 2702.1b. This moratorium does not apply
- 2 to charges under any of these provisions in which the underlying alleged actions address a
- 3 different subject matter, including but not limited to sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and
- 4 sexual harassment. This moratorium shall remain in effect until the close of the first General
- 5 Conference of The United Methodist Church after other denominations separate. Any
- 6 complaints pertaining to this paragraph filed during this period shall be held in abeyance, and
- 7 no time limits shall commence until the above-referenced General
- 8 Conference has concluded." -From the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation
